April Program: History and Geology of the North Pennine Orefield, England By Jesse Fisher, UK Mining Ventures

The North Pennine Orefield is a classic fluorineenriched MVT (Mississippi-Valley Type) deposit, remarkably similar to the Southern Illinois fluorspar district. It has been worked for much of the last millennium for lead, fluorite, barite, zinc, and other mineral commodities. Like Illinois, the region's mines have also been the source of many attractive mineral specimens.

Jesse will tell us about the history and geology of the district, and will have some specimens on hand to illustrate the topic. For show and tell, bring your favorite fluorite(s) from England, Illinois, or other localities.

Mindat has finally achieved its desired non-profit status, by joining the Hudson Institute of Mineralogy (<u>www.hudsonmineralogy.org/</u>) as an outreach program. The mindat site and operations will remain the same, and six mindat managers are now on the Hudson Institute Board of Directors.

Juna Museum Fire

In March, Tom Praszkier reported that the Juna Museum of Minerals in Szklarska Poręba, southwest Poland, had burned down. The fire started on the second floor at about 3am and ended up destroying large parts of the building and many of the minerals that were displayed and stored in it.

Tom says it was one of the best mineralogical museums in Poland, and the owners were actively involved in all mineral-connected cultural events in the region including Crystal Days in Lwówek Śląski and mindat meetings.
