


September Meeting Review

A little off the topic of minerals, but fascinating to the naturalists and geologists among us, Svalbard is an archipelago in the Arctic Ocean where researchers from the University of Iceland have discovered numerous vertebrate and invertebrate fossils. One particular discovery found its way into the mainstream news this week as University of Oslo researchers have revealed that numerous plesiosaurs, some up to ten meters long, have been unearthed in Svalbard. Take a look at the web page from Ólafur Ingólfsson, Professor of Glacial and Quaternary Geology for the University of Iceland Department of Geology and Geography and Institute of Earth Sciences. It discusses the various aspects of these inhospitable northern islands. In fact, he refers to the mountainous isles as a geologists "mecca". There are some excellent photos of the area, nice geologic maps and charts, and a brief description of the geography and geology of the area.
