After much hunting and finagling, we have a new (and eminently logical) site for our monthly meeting: the US Geological Survey in Menlo Park. Special thanks go to Gretchen Luepke, who sponsored BAM's request and helped shepherd it to a happy conclusion.

We will meet in room 3-237, aka Conference Room C, in Building 3. For those of you with a general knowledge of the USGS campus, building 3 is where the visitor center, map sales room and the auditorium are located. Our room is located on the second floor directly across the hall from the auditorium. There is an external stairway on the north side of the building with an entrance door at the top immediately adjacent to our room. Security will make sure this door is unlocked for us. (Across the walk from this stairway are the McKelvey Building and the library.) Depending on what's going on, other

entrances to the building may or may not be unlocked.

The USGS campus is located at 345 Middlefield Road in Menlo Park. It is most easily approached by US 101 to either Marsh Road if coming from SF or Willow Road if coming from SJ. Take either road westward from 101 to Middlefield Road and turn to continue in the same direction you were travelling on 101, i.e., USGS is located between Marsh and Willow. Clear Creek Update

Notes from El Jefe Spence:

"For those who weren't at the picnic, the status at Clear Creek is that the DRAFT environmental impact report will be issued in September, so be on the lookout for it, and do give BLM your inputs on it. It seems virtually impossible that the recreational ban at Clear Creek will be lifted before sometime in 2011 or 2012. The EIR must be finalized after public input and then the resource management plan must go through the same draft/public input/final process. I'm told the draft EIR includes 6 options, but I don't know the substance of any of them."
